There would be no hot cross buns - the reminder of Jesus' death on the cross, and the spices inside the bun a symbol of the spices put on his body after he died.





A fter the restrictions and lockdowns in 2020 it was great to have the opportunity to travel to Alice Springs with my daughter Gillian on her return trip. She had driven many kilometres solo to visit family and friends in Victoria (after Christmas) and I did not

need any encouragement to accompany her on her return journey which she had planned for January 7th, her intention being to include a visit to her daughters Tiffany and Elizabeth in N.S.W. as well as friends in parts of Victoria. We visited friends in Victoria




and we were delighted to see hundreds of bales of hay and full dams as we travelled the Calder, the Alternate Calder, the Wimmera, the Sunraysia and the Henty Highways in pursuit of addresses. We stayed in Bendigo overnight.

The planned entry to N.S.W. did not happen, as a swift N.S.W. border closure to Victorians cancelled our visit to Wagga Wagga. We needed permits to travel through South Australia and to enter the Northern Territory (all done on-line) within seven days of the date of travel. (This in Australia!)

The Western Highway negotiated, we spent two nights in accommodation in Adelaide, visiting family there before the long road was taken to an overnight stay in Coober Pedy and on our fourth day into Alice Springs. I have always considered the desert a magical place. I have travelled it often but never cease to be amazed at the vastness, the salt lakes and the desert growth. Coober Pedy, each time I pass through it has extended with the opal fields now covering many kilometres. We stayed in an Underground Motel, our room carved out of a rockface but with an outlook over the desert instead of actually being below ground.

After eleven days staying and enjoying the change of scenery of Alice Springs with Gillian and Shaun I flew with Qantas back to Melbourne with permits to enter two States. So pleased to be safely home but delighted I had that travel opportunity.

Facts about the Carers in your Village.

Week. All year round.

Last year was a stressful time for us all. Those in the health sector had the added pressure of doing COVID-19 training and keeping up to date with the latest health requirements. (This continues today.) As soon as we found out the facts, we were on to our contacts to ensure we had enough PPE equipment. Last year we received and attended 389 Emergency calls.

Training for Carers: All care staff are qualified Personal Carers and have 1st Aid training every 3 years and CPR updates every year. Courses we have provided are food handlers, dementia, diabetes management, skin care, and infection control to name a few. We are always improving our skills and knowledge.

This allows those trained with potentially lifesaving ability to assist an injured or ill person during a variety of emergency situations.

The skills that you learn from being a first aider are transferable to many other skills needed, such as staying calm in stressful, high-pressure situations. The care provided by a first aider in those first few minutes is absolutely vital.

A reminder to call staff **ANY** time you need Emergency Care. Don't wait until the morning, we are here during the night for any emergency. **Pendant:** Your Emergency pendant will only work around your unit/apartment. If you feel unwell outside of your unit/apartment press the emergency system where you are. e.g. Activities Centre, Community Centre etc. If you are visiting another unit/apartment press their emergency system. **Staff will attend where the call is activated.**

Update your details. If you change doctor or family move etc please update your details on Personal Information forms. Put this in writing, *attention to Lesley*.

Request for assistance. If your health professional requires you to have a dressing, blood pressure checks, eye drops etc we require this in writing. A note to say when to start when to finish. Staff then can do a care plan.

I have arranged a special lunch every month until the end of the year. So far this year we have had *Australia Day, Valentine's Day & Labour Day.* Next one is *Good Friday* -*Fisherman's Basket, Trifle and Hot Cross buns. Easter Sunday - Roast of the Day, Cheesecake and Easter Eggs.* Watch the notice boards for Special Lunches such as Anzac Day.

Happy Easter and all the very best from all the team at St John's.



Computer tips & tricks

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We all know how to turn our computers off by left clicking on the windows key, going to power, then shut down *(or restart if we need to)*.

Windows Key

But did you know that if you right click on the windows key it brings up a list that can be extremely useful; e.g.: **System** will show you details of your computer and operating system. **Device Manager** shows all devices running on the computer. If you need to check whether something is operating properly you can click on the > symbol at the left hand side of an item, such as: **Audio inputs and outputs** and show all microphones and speakers. If something isn't operating properly it will have a warning icon next to it. **Settings** takes you straight to the settings page etc.
