



COMPUTER TIPS & TRICKS

For some time I have been saying, wait, before converting from Windows 10 to Windows 11. I had already done so before the previous edition of Village Voice but forgot to say that I have had no troubles and it is now OK to make the switch.

One difference that disturbs some people is the placement of the taskbar in Windows 11. To move it: *Right-click a blank area on the taskbar, then click *Taskbar settings. The Settings app will open to *Personalization. Click the *Taskbar behaviours dropdown to see *more settings. From here, you can set the Taskbar alignment to *Left.
